Digging Through Time

An early incarnation of the SNGMS was the Mineralogical Society of Southern Nevada (MSSN). MSSN meeting locations alternated between the Las Vegas High School and the recreation room at the Department of Water and Power Building in Boulder City.

There was some internal disagreement between the members of the MSSN, probably over organizational bureaucracy. In February 1948, Paul Mercer invited 30 of the original MSSN members to meet at his home in Boulder City and they formed the Clark County Gem Collectors (CCGC).

The first CCGC meeting was held in 1948 at the Grace Community Church in Boulder City, Nevada. The CCGC continued to meet at the church, and there were monthly potlucks.

SNGMS Board Meeting Minutes for 6/3/2024

On June 3rd 2024, the regular Board of Directors meeting of the Southern Nevada Gem and Mineral Society was called to order at the Eagles' Lodge at 3:54 PM by the President. All Board members were present except the Parliamentarian and the 3 year Board member. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was recited.

Minutes: The minutes of the May 6, 2024 meeting were approved as read.

Treasurers Report: The balance of the checking account is \$34,344. The increase from the previous month was \$4,826, primarily due to the Jamboree profits. The investments balance is \$125,445. The maturing CD yielded a \$1,345 profit. A \$50,000 CD with a 12 month term and 5.3% interest was purchased.

SNGMS Lapidary Shop Report: One trim saw is down and waiting for parts for repair. The flat lap disks need replacement at a cost of \$1,400. A new flat lap machine at a cost of \$4,000 is requested. An order for oil will need to be made in August or September. An existing 24" saw may be added to the saw room. The CabKing wheels are still looking good after three weeks.

Bruce Martin proposed, seconded by David Ford, and approved by the Board, that "flat lap discs be purchased up to \$1,400." David Ford proposed, seconded by Bob Belcher, and approved by the Board, that "a new flat lap be purchased up to \$4,000." These proposals will be presented to the membership at the General meeting for approval. New member orientation will continue on an 'as needed' basis. A committee will be formed to implement equipment training and certification.

Unfinished Business: The SNGMS Scholarship Chair, Debbie Bucknam, and Mary Savage discussed previous scholarships that SNGMS had awarded at UNLV. Del Walkenshaw proposed, seconded by Bruce Martin, and approved by the Board, that "SNGMS will donate a \$1,000 scholarship to a UNLV student selected by the Earth Sciences professors next year instead of the current scholarship plan." This will be presented to the General membership for approval.

Shows: Orville Wiemers reported on the shows listed below.

- 2024 Boulder City Spring Jamboree Show – Budget was \$8,000, actual expenditures were \$7,928.57. The profit after all expenditures is \$8,752.93.

- Viva Las Vegas Rocks 2024 Show – 60% of vendor slots are taken.

New Business: Mary Savage proposed Joel Coombs for a lifetime membership. Orville Wiemers proposed Ron Mazz for a lifetime membership. The Board approved the proposals and they will be presented to the General Membership for approval.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:43 PM.

Treasurers Report: The Balance of checking account is \$34,344. The increase from the previous month was \$4,826, primarily due to the Jamboree profits. The investments balance is \$125,445. The maturing CD yielded a \$1,345 profit. A \$50,000 CD with a 12 month term and 5.3% interest was purchased.

Unfinished Business: None

Rock Spotlight: Uranium

Uranium is a dense metal. It is a poor conductor of electricity, malleable, and ductile. Uranium is naturally radioactive, emitting gamma radiation.

Uranium was discovered in 1789 by Martin Klaproth, a German chemist. He named it "uran" after the planet Uranus.

For many years, uranium was used mostly to color ceramic glazes (like the notorious Uranium Red Fiestaware) and for color tinting in early photography. Its radioactive properties were not recognized until 1866. Uranium is now used to power nuclear reactors that produce electricity, and to produce radioactive isotopes for medical, industrial, and defense purposes.



Lapidary/Jewelry Studio Tips & Tricks

Jewelry Hammers

Hammers are used to shape, form, and texture metal in handmade jewelry designs. Most hammers have two faces that are

differently sized or shaped; mallets have identical faces. Most hammers have straight handles. The exception is the chasing hammer, which has a bulbous handle. There are two basic hammer types: 1) hammers for striking metal and 2) hammers for striking tools, like stamps and punches. "Peen" refers to the business face of the hammer. A ball-peen is a ball-shaped face; a cross-peen is one that is at right angles to the hammer handle. Here's a simple guide to the anatomy of a hammer, different types of hammers, and what they are used for in the studio.

Hammer Anatomy

Face: a striking surface used on a piece of metal.

Neck: the slightly curved area near the face.

Peen (or pein): the opposite side of the face, mainly used for bending or shaping metal.

Cheek: the middle portion of the hammer head.

Eye: a hole in the head where a wedge connects the hammer head to the handle.

Head (or poll): the straight section beneath the face of the hammer.

Grip: where your hand holds the hammer handle

Types of Hammers

Six basic jewelry-making hammers are discussed below.

Ball-Peen Hammer: a good all-round hammer with a domed side and a flat round side. The ball side of the head is ideal for texturing metal, while the flat end can be used to hammer doming punches with a doming block to create curves and domes in flat metal.

Mallet: a mallet has two identical faces and can be made of plastic, rawhide, or metal. A rawhide mallet is commonly used to shape metal around a mandrel without leaving a hammer mark.



Raising Hammer: has two rectangular, blunt, or wedge-shaped cross-peen faces. It's used for raising sheet metal into shapes like bowls.



Jeweler's Hammer: this hammer is small and light weight, with one cross-peen face and one flat face. It is used for precision work such as riveting and shaping. It can also be used to flatten wire, and the thin tapered end can be used to texture metal.

Raising Hammer




Texturing Hammer: this hammer has machined or patterned faces, for striking texture directly onto metal. The SNGMS Lapidary Shop has a few texturing hammers with interchangeable heads for sale.

Chasing Hammer: has one flat face for striking tools like stamps and smoothing (planishing) metal, and one round face for forming and riveting. The handle has a bulbous end and a narrow neck for more bounce back and less strain on the wrist.







Mineral Musings Desert Varnish

Desert varnish may sound like the latest beauty trend, but it's actually a geological phenomenon that paints rocks in the desert with its unique colors. Desert varnish is a thin coating of dark manganese and iron oxide minerals that forms on the surface of rocks in arid environments. It's like nature's way of giving rocks a makeover, one layer at a time.

Ever wondered how this mysterious varnish ends up on rocks in the desert? Climate, rock composition, and microbial activity all play a part in the formation of desert varnish. Chemical reactions between minerals in the rock, and ions in water, create the recipe for desert varnish.

Manganese and iron oxides are the main ingredients in desert varnish, giving it its dark and often shiny appearance. These

elements bond with the rock surface, creating a durable coating. Desert varnish isn't just a pretty face – it plays a role in protecting rocks from weathering and erosion. The coating is laid down by bacteria that use manganese as a sunscreen!

Manganese oxides turn dark when old bacteria cells die and new ones take over. In this way, the varnish builds up in layers.


Geologists use desert varnish as a natural archive, recording environmental changes and geological events over thousands of years. Its presence on rocks tells a story of past climates, landscapes, and even human activity. By studying the growth rate of desert varnish layers, scientists can estimate the age of rock surfaces and archaeological artifacts like petroglyphs. This dating method is known as varnish microlamination.

If you scratch through the varnish layer, the lighter-colored rock underneath is exposed. For thousands of years, Native Americans used desert varnish to create petroglyphs. In Clark County, Nevada there are elaborate petroglyphs including spirals, circles, wavy lines, footprints, people, deer, and bighorn sheep.

Pollution, climate change, and vandalism threaten the preservation of desert varnish. Airborne pollutants can degrade it, while physical disturbances to rock surfaces can disrupt its growth and development. Conservationists and researchers are working to protect and preserve desert varnish through monitoring programs, public awareness campaigns, and sustainable land management practices.

To understand desert varnish formation, analytical techniques like scanning electron microscopy, X-ray diffraction, and isotopic analysis are used. By combining field observations with laboratory analyses, researchers can piece together a comprehensive picture of desert varnish and its significance in the natural world.
